Interdisciplinary and intercultural, *Exhale* is about indigeneity, accountability and trauma. It explores the relationships and boundaries forged between Indigenous cultures on foreign lands; negotiations between environmental and urban lifestyles; and the ability to heal through storytelling.

Exhale is the creation of **Black Birds**—the Sydney collective fast gaining kudos for energetic, uplifting performances that astutely dissect the female Black and Brown experience in Australia. She has also performed with collectives such as Between Two Worlds, The Dollar Bin Darlings, and The Oyster Club; was Assistant Director for La Boite's The Village; and has toured works for Black Birds around the East Coast of Australia, Aotearoa and Barbados.
