ASH FLANDERS

WRITER/PERFORMER

Ash Flanders is a multi-award-winning writer and performer based in Melbourne. He most recently wrote and starred in SS Metaphor (Malthouse Theatre), Ash Flanders is Nothing (Brunswick Ballroom) and The Temple (Malthouse Theatre). He created queer theatre company Sisters Grimm with Declan Greene, co-writing and performing in: for Malthouse Theatre/Sydney Theatre Company: Calpurnia Descending;

for Melbourne Theatre Company: *Lilith: The Jungle Girl*; for MTC Neon: *The Sovereign Wife*; and for Sydney Theatre Company: *Little Mercy*. As an actor, Ash's credits include: for Belvoir: *Hedda*; for Little Ones Theatre: *Psycho Beach Party*; for Malthouse Theatre/Sydney Theatre Company: *Blackie Blackie Brown*; and for Melbourne Theatre Company: *Buyer & Cellar*. His cabaret works have toured across the country and include *Meme Girls*, *Negative Energy Inc.*, *Playing to Win and Special Victim*. He has won several Green Room Awards and lost even more. He once lost a Helpmann award to Tennessee Williams and they haven't spoken since. He is very excited to present his latest play *This is Living* at Malthouse in 2023 and yes, television continues to prove elusive.



STEPHEN NICOLAZZO

DIRECTOR

Stephen is a Naarm-based theatremaker, director and co-founder of queer theatre company Little Ones Theatre. He is also Co-Artistic Director of Western Edge with Chanella Macri and John Marc Desengano. Recent credits include: for Griffin/La Mama: *The Happy Prince*, for which he won a Green Room Award for Best Director; for Griffin/Arts Centre Melbourne: *Merciless Gods*; for Belvoir/

Malthouse Theatre: Looking for Alibrandi: for Brisbane Festival/Joel Bray Dance: Considerable Sexual Licence: for Malthouse Theatre: Loaded: and for Melbourne Theatre Company: Abigail's Party. Stephen's other directing credits include: for Arts Centre Melbourne/Arts House/Brisbane Festival/Darwin Festival/Joel Bray Dance/ Liveworks/Perth Festival: Daddy; for Brisbane Festival/Rock Surfers/Theatre Works: Psycho Beach Party: for Brisbane Powerhouse/Darwin Festival/MTC Neon: Dangerous Ligisons: for Malthouse Theatre Helium: Salome: for MKA/Old Fitz: sex.violence.blood. gore: for Red Stitch Actors Theatre: The Moors. Suddenly Last Summer: for Theatre Works: Dracula; and for Token Entertainment National Tour: Judith Lucy and Denise Scott's Still Here. He has collaborated with Ash Flanders since 2012 on cabaret and contemporary performance work including: for Adelaide Cabaret Festival: Special Victim; for Arts Centre Melbourne: Playing to Win; for Brunswick Ballroom: Ash Flanders is Nothing; for Malthouse Theatre: Meme Girls; and for Theatre Works: Negative Energy Inc. His productions have received 12 Green Room Award wins and a Sydney Theatre Award. Stephen was also the recipient of the Besen Family Artist Award in 2009 through Malthouse Theatre and was a member of the 2019 Lincoln Centre Theatre's Directors Lab (New York City). He is also a teaching artist for Victorian College of the Arts, COLLARTS, Monash University, and Melbourne Theatre Company Education.



NATHAN BURMEISTER

Designer

Nathan Burmeister is a Melbourne-based set and costume designer who works closely with new styles, forms, stories, and explores contemporary aesthetics and audience experiences. Nathan's recent works include: for Before Shot Productions: *Sneakyville*; for Bloomshed: *Animal Farm*; for Bloomshed/Darebin Arts Speakeasy: *Paradise Lost*; for Darebin Arts Speakeasy: *End Of.*; for Darebin Arts

RACHEL BURKE

Lighting Designer

Rachel has an extensive and highly awarded body of work over three decades for main stage companies, independent theatre and architectural lighting design both nationally and internationally. Industry acknowledgment includes ten Green Room Awards for Theatre Lighting Design, IES Victorian and National Awards of Excellence for Lighting Design in 2005, 2010 and 2019 and

Helpmann Award nominations in 2005 and 2015. Rachel held an academic position at Melbourne University/VCA Production and Design 2017–2019 and is Senior Associate at Relume Consulting. She is a graduate from Rusden Victoria College with a Bachelor of Education Secondary in Drama and Dance. Recent theatre design credits include: for Belvoir/Melbourne Theatre Company: *Sexual Misconduct of the Middle Classes*; for Kadimah Yiddish Theatre/Arts Centre Melbourne: *Yentl*; and for Red Stitch Actors Theatre: *The Amateurs*.



TOM BACKHAUS

Sound Designer

Tom is a freelance composer, sound designer and producer. As a sound designer he is known for his densely layered and evocative scores for theatre. A Music Technology graduate of the Queensland Conservatorium of Music, Tom draws upon his detailed understanding of music production, melding pre-recorded music and sound with live instrumentation to create dynamic and reactive

scores. Some of his credits include: for Lab Kelpie: *Become the One*; for Melbourne Theatre Company: *Astroman*; for Malthouse Theatre: *The Importance of Being Ernest*, *The Temple*; for Red Stitch Actors Theatre: *The Feather in the Web*; for VIMH: *let bleeding girls lie*. In 2017, Tom was a recipient of the Besen Family Artist Placement at the Malthouse Theatre, working with Jethro Woodward on *The Real and Imagined History of the Elephant Man*. As a producer, Tom is best known for his work with drag comedy group Dazza and Keif. He has presented their debut work *Dazza and Keif Go Viral* in Adelaide, Melbourne (for which he was awarded Best Emerging Producer at the Melbourne Fringe Festival), Sydney and Wellington. In 2019 he presented the group's follow-up *Dazza and Keif Go Viral in Space with Ya Mum* at the Melbourne Fringe Festival along with a site-specific contemporary dance piece *Dark Points*. Tom also produces the queer festivalette, Get Bent Fest, showcasing LGBTQIA+ talent from Midsumma Festival and beyond.



JEN JACKSON

Stage manager

Jen Jackson (she/her) is a Korean-Australian stage manager, living and working on Gadigal land, with a particular passion for new Australian work and a commitment to diversity in theatre. After attending UNSW in a Bachelor of Arts majoring in Theatre & Performance, she continued her studies at NIDA with a degree in Technical Theatre & Stage Management. Recent productions she

has stage managed include: for Griffin: Golden Blood (黄金血液); for Contemporary Asian Australian Performance: Double Delicious; for Kurinji/SAtheCollective: 宿 (stay); and for National Theatre of Parramatta: Nothing. Jen hopes to help bring to life stories of all kinds that challenge, entertain, reflect, make us feel, think, and examine ourselves—the kind of stuff that made her fall in love with theatre in the first place.

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
